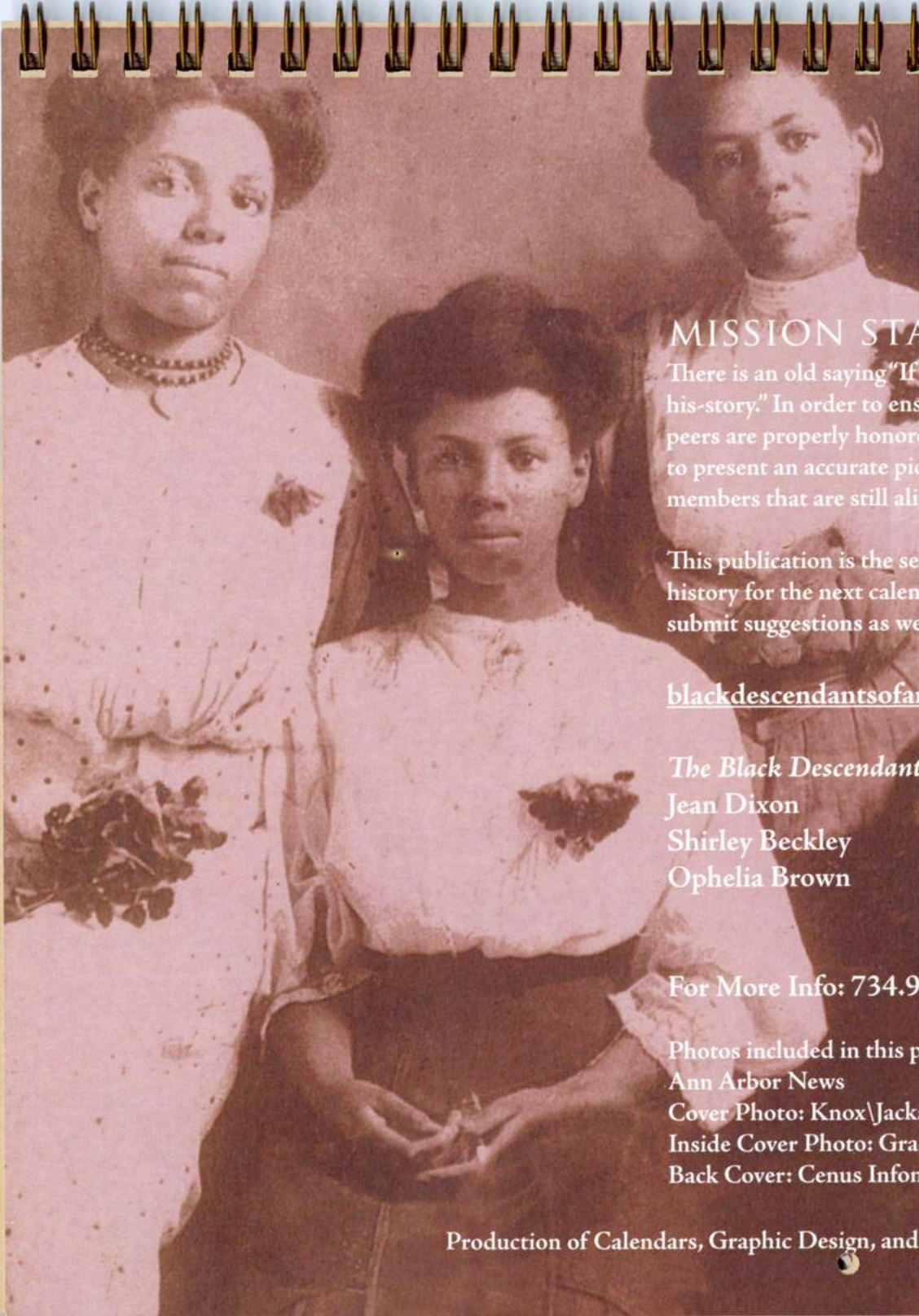

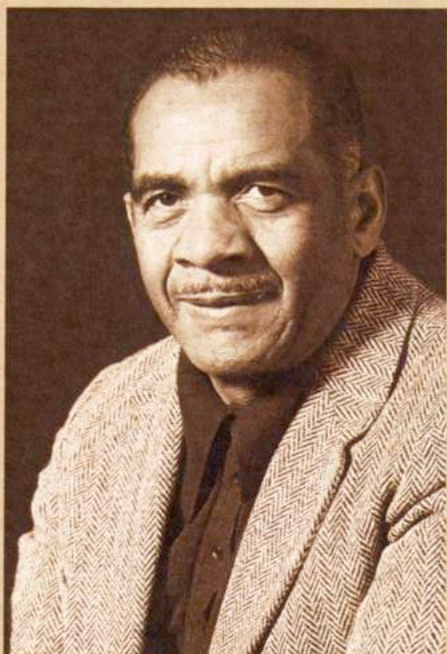

WILLIS C. PATTERSON

COMMUNITY LEADERS



Willis C. Patterson graduated from Ann Arbor High School in 1949. He holds two degrees in voice performance from the University of Michigan, and a Doctoral Degree in Higher Education Administration, from Wayne State University in Detroit, Michigan.

Dr. Willis Patterson, has had an extensive career as a singer of Jazz, Opera, Oratorio, solo recitalist of art songs in German, French, Italian, Russian and English. He has also taught voice performance at two historically Black Colleges and Universities. Emeritus Professor of Voice at the University of Michigan's School of Music, he was the first African American professor in the University of Michigan's School of Music, following successful appearances in Europe as an opera performer and recitalist.

Dr. Patterson's research work has featured the art song compositions of African American composers, and he is regarded as one of the foremost experts of this song repertory in the world. He has published two anthologies of African American Art Songs, and one collection of Negro Spirituals.

Willis C. Patterson has also spent his career committed to providing education through opportunity to the youth of Ann Arbor and abroad. He is the co-founder of the African American Endowment Fund which provides funding for aspiring students, musicians and community efforts.

THEODORE & BARBARA MEADOWS



Married 48 years Theodore and Barbara Meadows dedicated their lives and careers towards doing the right thing for themselves and their community. Theodore Meadows, a noted Physician passed in June of 2005 but not before he influenced the lives of many. He chaired the boards of clinics, and the Ann Arbor Housing Commission and was the director of several other organizations including Red Cross and Arbor Hospice.

Barbara Meadows obtained a Master's degree in social work from Smith College before she began a career in the Ann Arbor Public Schools. 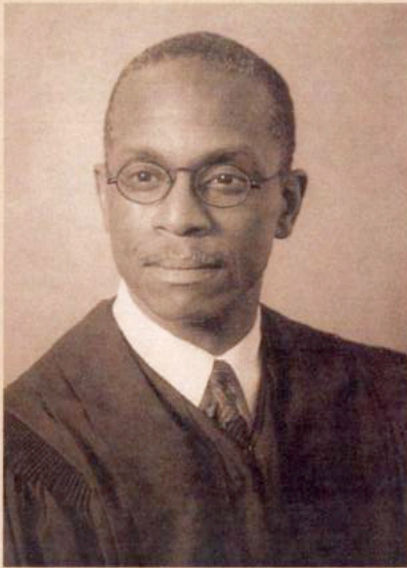

CEDRIC SIMPSON

U PHOLDING THE LAW



The Honorable J. Cedric Simpson was appointed to the 14A District Court Bench in September of 1999 and has also served as Chief Judge. Simpson was the first African American Judge to preside in Washtenaw County. An Ann Arbor Native, Judge Simpson graduated from Pioneer High School in 1979 and obtained his Bachelors at The University of Maryland Eastern Shore and his Juris Doctor from the University of Maryland in 1986. Judge Simpson is a member of numerous civic and charitable organizations and has received several awards:

2002 Jurist of the Year- Police Officers Association of Michigan

2004 Father Bernard J. O'Conner Award by the Dispute Resolution Center 2007 Animal Humanitarian Award

2007 Professionalism Award by the National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc.

NANCY C. FRANCIS



The Honorable Nancy C. Francis was born and raised in Ann Arbor. She graduated from Ann Arbor St. Thomas High School and received her undergraduate and law degrees from the University of Michigan. She was an activist for civil rights and liberties throughout her adult life and practiced law for 16 years primarily representing low and moderate income citizens. Judge Francis served as a volunteer in the United States Peace Corps in Peru. Judge Francis was the first African-American in the Washtenaw County judiciary and served 10 years as the primary Judge of the Washtenaw County Juvenile Courts. She is the recipient of a number of awards including the Sojourner Truth National Meritorious Service Award from the National Association of Negro and Professional Women and Medal for Excellence in Bi-Lingual Literacy through the South American Literacy Society.

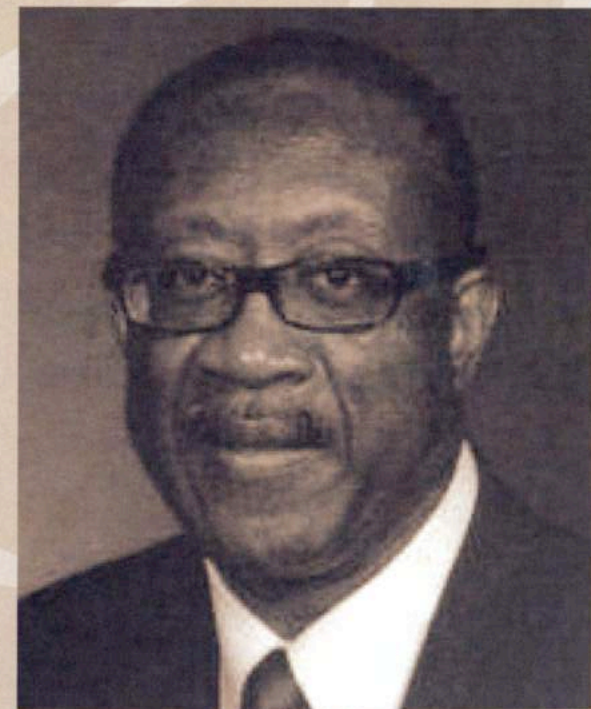

FOUNTAIN CHURCH OF GOD IN CHRIST



In 1962 the church purchased a larger property at 411 Fountain Street, the church at the time became incorporated with the State of Michigan and the name changed to Fountain Church of God in Christ. In 1995 the beloved Pastor Elder Booker T. Rimson was called home, his son in the gospel Elder Samuel L. Peppers, was appointed Pastor and has led the congregation since. Today Fountain Church of God in Christ is located at 530 W. Stadium Blvd.



Fountain Church of God In Christ Built on Faith. The Churches history alone tells a story of belief and faith, in 1928 the mission was to begin when Elder Kissertine sent Elder Montgomery to Ann Arbor to begin work. Elder Montgomery was arrested for preaching the word of God.

The work never stopped, after several elders joined the mission in 1943 Elder Booker T. Rimson Sr. increased the membership and under his leadership the church was able to purchase a building at 616 High Street.

Those same residents and leaders prevailed on City Council to honor Ann Arbor's only black mayor by re-naming the park to honor former Mayor and Civil Rights activist Dr. Albert Wheeler. Wheeler Park represents progress and struggle made by many in the Village.

2011 Marks the 16th Annual Festival and thousands of people enjoy festivities, food and cultural interaction with Ann Arbor's diverse population.

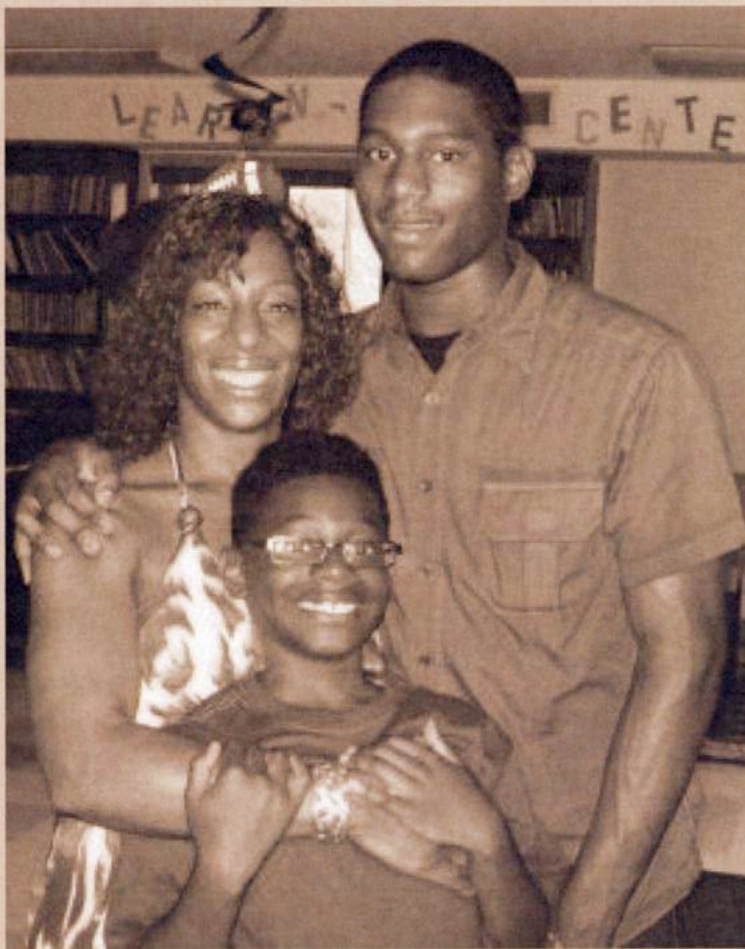

KIMARIO & KAMIL MCFADDEN

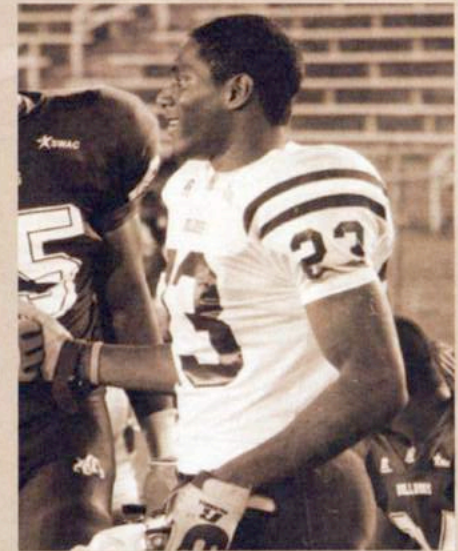
BIG BROTHER, LITTLE BROTHER

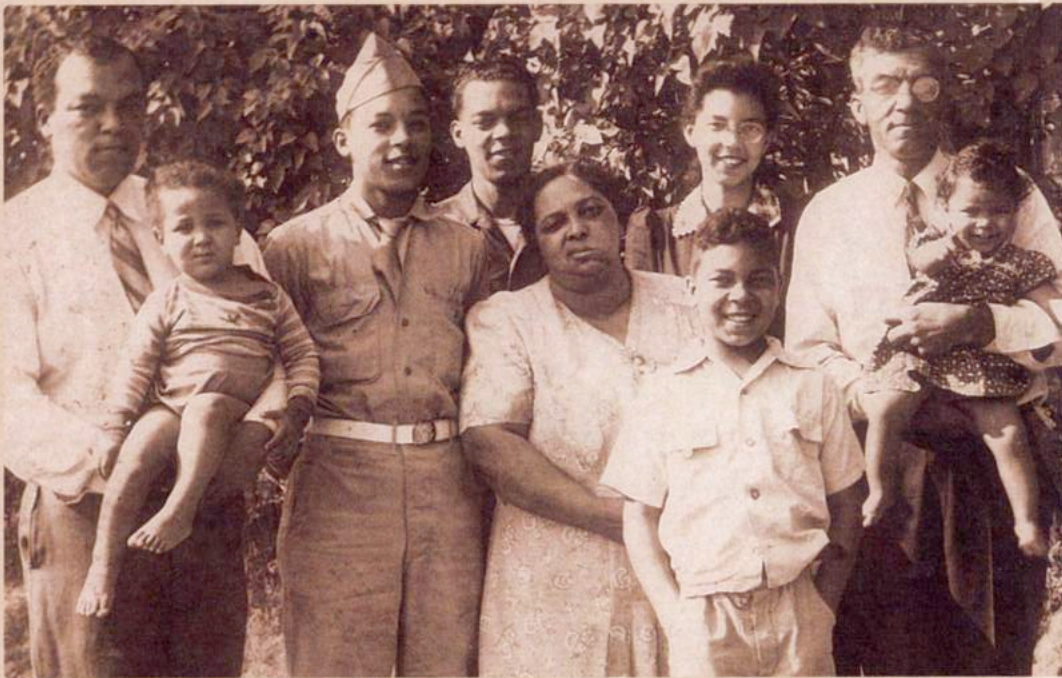

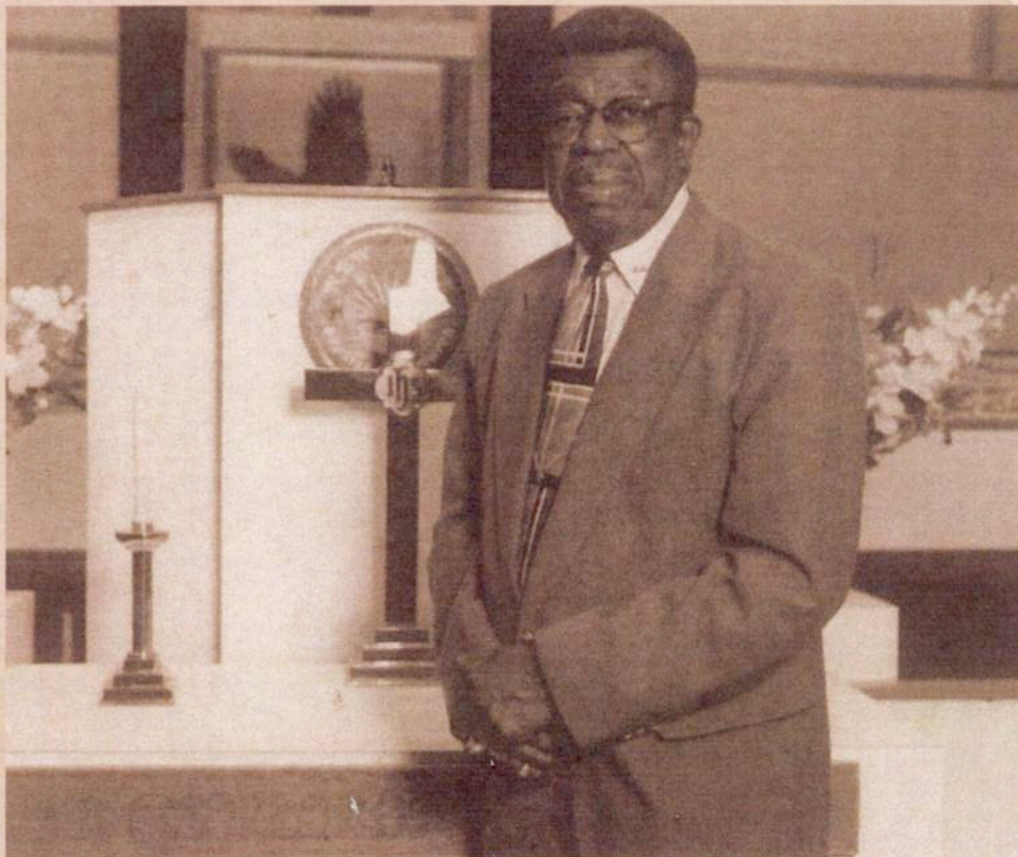
